Drive Home the Message of Texting while Driving with Teens

Getting into a car accident is the last thing on a teenage driver's mind when she goes to answer a text message, but the fact is that a 2008 poll taken by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration showed 16% of all fatal crashes in that year were a result of driver distraction. That means 16% of the accidents that happened in 2008 could have been prevented if the drivers just kept their eyes on the road.

Mr. Al Teutonico, a Driver's Ed teacher, has said that with the teens just learning how to drive in general, adding a cell phone and texting while they drive just brings more danger to them and he says, "It's an obvious danger... Using your eyes and your hands to text - it's just an accident waiting to happen." High school junior, Diana Magnani, is taking her road test for the first time in a few weeks. She's excited to drive and she is aware of the dangers of driving while texting. When asked about her views on texting and driving she said that she thinks it's terrible, "Even when I'm in the Drive ers Ed car and I hear my phone vibrate, I get really nervous and then all of a sudden my focus is distracted... wondering who the text is from, but then, I say 'Wait I'm driving I have to focus." It's no question that texting and driving is not safe.

In an article from KING 5 News in Olympia, Washington, a 24 year old driver lost control of her car driving down a state route which resulted in her crashing into another car injuring the other driver and killing herself. The Troopers investigating found an open cell phone in the wreckage determining this was the cause of the accident. Good Morning America did a story in July 2007 where five western New York cheerleaders died in a car accident when they were on their way to celebrate their recent graduation. The authorities among other things. are now saying texting may have been the cause of the horrific accident. Another horrible example was reported in The Gothamist that a 53-year-old Brooklyn deliveryman was announced brain dead in September 2010 after a teen driver, who had been texting, struck him while he was making a turn on his scooter. Many states have laws against texting and driving. In 2010, a number of states have signed new cell

phone and texting while driving laws. In Connecticut, former Governor Jodi Rell has signed Senate Bill 427 into law that says a driver will receive a ticket if he/she sends, types or reads a text message or uses any electronic device while the vehicle is moving. In April 2010, Kentucky Governor, Steve Beshear, signed the new law prohibiting drivers under 18 years old years from texting or using a cell phone while driving a car. Text messaging is banned in thirty states and the District of Columbia for all drivers, in eight states for novice drivers and is banned in two states for school bus operators, according to Highway Safety Research and Communications. In our own state of New York, the use of handheld phones and texting is banned for all drivers.

Awareness of this growing problem is being spread. Among many videos and articles, AT&T has a new ten-minute documentary called "The Last Text", showing stories of real people whose lives have been greatly affected by texting while driving. On Oprah.com, Oprah Winfrey has dedicated a section of her website to the cause of awareness called No Phone Zone. The section has many articles about texting and driving awareness, tributes to many of the victims injured or killed in accidents. In April of 2009 an online pledge was created declaring one will not text while driving. As of February 23, 2011, there have been 420,402 people who have made the pledge. The Allstate Foundation has a website, www.keepthedrive.com, whose mission is to educate young drivers and their parents about the dangers of unsafe driving. 

Staten Islanders woke up to the news of a new congressman November 3, 2010. Incumbent Congressman Michael E. McMahon lost the election for Congressional representative of New York's thirteenth congressional district to GOP Tea Party favorite Michael Grimm.

Although this seemed like a fatal blow for the Staten Island Democratic Party for interns who spent countless hours of their summer in McMahon's campaign headquarters, the experience gained was invaluable. Several Hill students took advantage of the opportunities these internships had to offer. Interns were able to attend events with the congressman and interact with constituents, allowing them to gain a greater sense of what issues are really pressing in their community. Although some citizens were not very receptive and some were just rude, Hill students gained a greater respect for Staten Islanders and the struggles that face them every day.

Interns were also given the chance to meet and speak to Former President Bill Clinton, not exactly a typical summertime activity for most high school students.

When they weren't brushing elbows with leaders of the free world, the interns on the McMahon team made thousands of phone calls, knocked on doors, and mailed out thousands of letters, all in an effort to fight voter apathy and growing discontent here on Staten Island. Tuesdays With Morrie ~ By Mitch Albom



Monkey Bread

A few years ago I began a new tradition, baking together with my family. We started with simple pre-packaged cookies, but I felt that homemade goods always tasted better. Eventually, we began to bake one of my favorite treats, monkey bread. Although my family and I still try out new recipes any time we can, monkey bread still seems to be one of the most comforting and satisfying desserts that we all enjoy.

Ingredients

- 3 (12 ounce) packages refrigerated biscuit dough
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 stick butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts (optional)
- 1/2 cup raisins (optional)

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray the Bundt pan with cooking spray.

2. Mix the white sugar and cinnamon on a pie plate until they are completely mixed. Remove biscuits from tubes and cut each into quarters. Place each piece into sugar and cinnamon mixture until completely covered.

3. Place biscuit pieces evenly throughout Bundt pan.

4. In a small saucepan, melt the butter and brown sugar over low heat until fully mixed together. Stir with wooden spoon. Pour mixture over the biscuits.

5. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Let bread cool in pan for 10 minutes.

To serve, turn Bundt pan upside down onto a plate. Do not cut. The bread just pulls apart for a tasty treat!
